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

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## TO OUR READERS



## **STILL COOKING FAMILY RECIPES**

Ortega's Taco Shop Pushes Ahead



A YEAR AGO, The Observer sat down with Mave Greene and her daughter, Natalie Greene, to talk about their recent experience of moving Ortega's Taco Shop from the bare-bones former service station at Lancaster Circle in Ranson to the historic Charles Washington Hall at the center of downtown Charles Town. Just six weeks after the new shop opened, our reporter noted that there were lines a dozen deep, stretching from the counter to the front door.

with employees dashing between the crush of customers at the counter and pitching in with prep in the kitchen.

Today the shop is still busy, but with a different atmosphere. The same approach to the food, but a lot of rethinking about the operations. Last year we noted that Mave would wear many hats around the shop — telephone answerer, cashier, taco maker, prep, and business manager. But when we spoke this month, Mave credited

her daughter as the person pushing Ortega's to navigate the turbulence of the pandemic. "If it hadn't been for Natalie, starting with the idea of the taco kits and then expanding, we probably would have stayed closed."

Both Mave and Natalie share a strong sense of family. Perhaps it's the stories of their family heritage in La Paz, Baja Sur, Mexico, where the recipes that influence the shop's menu originate. Located roughly 900 miles south of San Diego, California, almost at the tip of the Baja peninsula, the La Paz region is a sea-side desert in the tropics, and the cuisine there reflects the climate. Food preparation is lighter, with an emphasis on fruit, very fresh, and a purposeful balance of spices. Mave noted that growing up, her experience was "tacos as an appetizer — a taquito and a drink." Natalie recalled how the kitchen smells of her childhood here in Jefferson County were synonymous with Mave's home cooking: "I loved that smell and I want our customers to experience the feeling I had when I was a kid, the way I grew up. It's a simple menu and you can trust the food."

When the pandemic hit, Natalie pondered the shop's next steps. She had already been working to launch the website and update the ordering system from the traditional paper slips and shouting into the kitchen. The first step was to "design the taco kits, so our customers could put together a simple meal at home. Then we brought back one person for a week, then a second as the business picked up. By the end of April we were getting into the routine of phone orders and curbside pickup and by May we had a full menu to offer. It's been great working with Bushel & Peck — we share a lot of customers and coordinate so they can schedule a single pickup at the curb out front."


Reflecting on her own feelings, Natalie shared, "I feel disappointed for our customers. It's a huge blow for us that we can't give our customers what they want. We have a routine now, but it's a different type of normal and

every week is different. People ask when we are going to let them in. Sometimes I get yelled at. I understand it's an emotional impact for people. But I'm thinking constantly about the safety of our family and staff." Mave emphasized also, that beyond the food, the success of the shop has always been about "the showtime. We are always listening and adapting. Right now, we focus on sharing a little bit of happiness."





## **SUSTAINING PLASTIC RECYCLING**

The Road Ahead for the Berkeley County Recycling Program



CLINT HOGBIN HAS BEEN focusing on trash and recycling for three decades. Looking back at how the Berkeley County Solid Waste Authority has evolved over that time he noted that an early driver of its efforts was the "diversion of trash from roadsides. Picking up materials alongside the road is the most expensive way to process it. The markets for trash and recycling go up and down but the issues of waste disposal always need to be solved."

The Waste Authority started plastic recycling in 2000. Southern Scrap in Winchester was the buyer, paying 2 cents a pound. In 2015, Southern Scrap gave six months notice that they

would no longer accept plastic. Coincidentally the Martinsburg Union Rescue Mission had been looking to expand its work program of bundling and baling materials and a board member connected with Hogbin. He also found Trigon, a plastic re-processing company based in Newmanstown, Pennsylvania (just to the east of Harrisburg). By the time the next truck of plastics was full, Hogbin had an entirely new process in place.

## **Counting the Pennies**

Hogbin noted that the recycling business is very attuned to the cost of transportation. Instead

of being paid (by Southern Scrap) "we pay the Rescue Mission 2 cents a pound. But they are right here in Martinsburg so our truck doesn't drive very far. If you look at Morgan County, they had the same issue, but it's too far to haul the material to Martinsburg, so our approach didn't work for them." The local proximity also lowers the costs of curbside pickup services. Hogbin talked through the numbers — "if you have a truck on a route in the county picking up single-stream recycling, even if it can fill up and drive to Hagerstown it still drives back empty. Having the facility here allows us to separate materials and consolidate loads."

## Where to Put it Next?

Hogbin responded to the recent National Public Radio coverage of the economics of plastics recycling by focusing on the future instead of the past: In the past few years "the United States has had to face a transition in how we handle these materials. We used to bail it and put it on a boat to China. Now we need to process it locally. In the end, this transition can be a good thing, if we approach it as an opportunity for expanding employment, for expanding markets for the materials, and for pushing to clean up the materials. Look at the alternatives. Landfills typically operate for thirty or forty years before they are full, but then you have to monitor them for another thirty and keep mowing them after that. You can't just let it turn into a field because that would risk something growing down into the liner. It's a cost that is always there."

"Demand from the customers will drive the market. It's a culture that has to drive change. Look at Europe, they ban new landfills and they force the economics to work. You can look at the corporations that choose where they

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locate their facilities. A global manufacturer like P&G or Clorox will have a zero waste policy and they design their products and containers to recycle, looking at it as a product cost that needs to be controlled. The local community support and culture matters to them as they make decisions on where to invest."

## **Hope and Change**

Hogbin has no illusions about the current difficulties in making recycling programs work. "It's struggling in West Virginia. The legislature has discussed increasing funding and they are auditing the grant programs. Our funding from the state has been effectively flat since 1989." After the conversation with *The Observer*,

Hogbin followed up with two pieces of news, the first evidencing support of recycling: the Charleston City Council voted to add funding to restart the curbside program in that city. Highlighting the challenges ahead was the news that the recycling facility that accepts Berkeley County's plastic is seeing reduced demand for its products and has put a limit on how much Hogbin can ship. As he noted at the start of our conversation, the markets go up and down, but the need to deal with trash never really goes away.

The Grapevine Road Recycling Center at 111 Landfill Road, Martinsburg is open Monday to Saturday 9:00 am to 5:00 pm (any WV resident can drop off household recyclable materials). 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## A Day's Adventure With the Family

River Riders in Harpers Ferry is a prime location for the adventurous among us. With a brand new 1000-foot long zipline over the Potomac River and the Aerial Adventure park featuring nine different difficulty levels, this place will get your heart pumping! They even have a kids zipline course designed specifically with the little ones (ages 4-6) in mind. The nearby White Horse Tavern currently offers outdoor dining and live music, making this one of the coolest outings for the whole family to enjoy. They will continue to run the ziplines through November, along with some fall camping, paddling, rafting, and floating activities.

## Get On Your Bike

If you want to try mountain biking, Rolling Ridge Trail in Harpers Ferry has over 7 miles of trails which can be easily accessed via Mission Road (see the resource link box below). For a longer day of riding and exploring, check out Cacapon Resort State Park in Berkeley Springs. This park has over 33 miles of mountain biking trails, including the scenic Overlook Trail and the more challenging Ziler Loop.

Over on the Maryland side of the Potomac River, we recommend the C&O Canal Towpath for folks looking to get outside, enjoy the fresh fall air, and see the changing leaves in a gentler manner. The canal offers bikers a flat, beginner-friendly means of enjoying nature. The stretch between Edward Ferry and the bridge at Shepherdstown has recently been resurfaced, creating a smooth ride for both novice and experienced riders. The towpath is easily accessible via many parking areas, but one we recommend is the Cushwa Basin parking area in Williamsport, MD. This stretch of the towpath passes by a lock house and newly restored aqueduct, giving riders a quaint glimpse of the town's historic past.

The Western Maryland Rail Trail runs parallel to the C&O Canal for 28 miles, between Big Pool and Sideling Hill (there are small parking lots near both ends). This paved surface allows for a broad variety of activities such as biking, walking, and inline skating. This trail is also wheelchair accessible, which provides opportunities for people of all abilities to enjoy the great outdoors.

## **Scaling The Cliffs**

West Virginia encompasses several of the East Coast's best climbing opportunities. With over 3000 sport and bouldering routes, the New

River Gorge is annually ranked as one of the top ten climbing destinations in America. Closer to the Panhandle, Seneca Rocks is home to the only true climbing summit east of Devil's Tower, Wyoming. Towering some 900 feet above the confluent creeks below, the south peak of Seneca leaves climbers with a view and adventure to remember.

Other outdoor climbing destinations closer to the panhandle include: Harper's Ferry, which hosts the area's only multi-pitch climbing; Elizabeth Furnace in VA, which offers moderate sport climbing; and Sugarloaf and Annapolis Rocks in MD, which provide several single-pitch traditional and top roping options. We recommend seeking out qualified instruction if you are heading to a new area to climb or are looking to increase your technical skills. The Climbing New Heights rock climbing gym near Martinsburg can help you plan and prepare.

## On Your Feet

The nearby region offers outdoor enthusiasts a plethora of beautiful hiking trails, each of which has its own unique biodiversity and stunning views. The Harpers Ferry National Historical Park is a good jumping off point to access the Appalachian Trail, C&O Canal, and Potomac Heritage National Scenic Trail. CSX

has repaired the footbridge across the Potomac River, and the parking lot located at the train station, the river lot on Shenandoah street, and the Cavalier Heights parking area are all open. The Park Service is encouraging visitors to observe pandemic health guidelines and has currently paused shuttle bus service from the visitor center parking lot. An annual park pass, good for a single vehicle/family, is \$35.



## // WELLNESS

On the Maryland side of the Potomac, Antietam National Battlefield hosts several miles of loop-like trails that range in difficulty. Several monuments and trail markers provide an educational experience as hikers and walkers meander through this hallowed ground.

Catoctin Mountain Park boasts 25 miles of hiking trails and stunning views from the top of Chimney Rock, Wolf Rock, and the Cunningham Falls overlook. For explorers looking for a weekend-long adventure, the Catoctin National Recreation Trail offers 26.6 miles of beautiful Blue Ridge Mountain hiking.

For a faster pace, West Virginia boasts some of the most beautiful running both on road and trail. Two Rivers Treads organizes group runs, free workshops, and clinics to keep you running healthy. All are welcome to join their staff for a group run every Tuesday at 8:30 am in the Keys Gap parking lot for a 5-7 mile trail run or every Wednesday at 6 pm at their Ranson store (400 South Mildred St) for a dynamic road run and drills. Put your training to use with a virtual Fun Run put on by Freedom's Run on October 3 (see resource links).

## **Exploring & Learning**

The Cool Springs Preserve operated by the Potomac Valley Audubon Society (PVAS) offers 63 acres of forest, marsh, and meadow, which allow guests to immerse themselves in nature. The PVAS website also offers several online and virtual opportunities to learn more about the nature found in your own backyard. These web activities include fall-themed nature journaling and a virtual Habitat Highlight seminar. PVAS also offers several in-person bird watching experiences.

If you are looking for inspiration or a recovery day, the EDventure series by the Appalachian Trail Conservancy offers opportunities to experience the trail virtually with weekly interactive Zoom sessions. See you Outside!



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## **VOTING IN JEFFERSON COUNTY**



**THE WEST VIRGINIA** Secretary of State maintains the **GoVoteWV.com** website portal to assist with voting questions, registration, and absentee ballot requests.

## **REGISTER TO VOTE**

October 13 is the last day to register to vote.

## Visit GoVoteWV.com to:

- Register online (blue "register to vote" button)
- Confirm that your registration is active (blue "check voter registration record" button)

## **VOTE IN PERSON - EARLY**

You can vote early between **October 21 and October 31** at the historic courthouse building at 100 E Washington St, Charles Town WV. The early voting location is open 9:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday and also Saturdays (Oct 24 & 31). The earling voting location will NOT be open on Election Day (Tue, Nov 3).

See Voter ID requirements for what to bring when you vote.

## **VOTE ABSENTEE - REQUEST A BALLOT**

## Visit GoVoteWV.com to:

- Request an absentee ballot (red "absentee voting" button)
- Request a military (UOCAVA) absentee ballot if you are serving outside WV

Concern for COVID-19 exposure is a valid medical reason for requesting an absentee ballot (check the first box in section 4-A of the application).

## ABSENTEE BALLOT - MAIL OR DROP OFF

You have two options to return your absentee ballot:

Mail it so that it is postmarked by Tuesday, November 3 (or earlier).

Drop off your absentee ballot in-person by Monday, November 2 (or earlier) at the Jefferson County Clerk's office in the historic courthouse building (100 E Washington St, Charles Town WV). You may drop off your own ballot and 1 other person's ballot (e.g. spouse, parent, child). Open 9:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday.

If you request an absentee ballot and **decide to vote in person**, bring the absentee ballot with you to your polling place on Election Day and exchange it for a standard ballot (otherwise you will be directed to cast a provisional ballot).

You may track your absentee ballot at GoVoteWV.com (blue "track absentee ballot" button). If it says "no result" you can go to your polling place on Election Day and request a provisional ballot.

## **VOTE IN PERSON - ON ELECTION DAY**

Election day is **Tuesday, November 3.** All voting locations (the "polls") are open from 6:30 in the morning to 7:30 in the evening.

Two voting locations will be relocated on Election Day:

- Precincts 23A & 23B, moved from Jefferson Academy to Crosspoint Church (3066 S Childs Rd, Kearneysville)
- Precinct 14, moved from Camp Hill Wesley Church to Harpers Ferry Middle School (1710 N Washington St, Harpers Ferry)

## **ELECTION DAY - WHAT TO EXPECT**

Jefferson County uses the ExpressVote system. You will receive a paper ballot card to insert in a touch-screen voting machine. You can select a choice for each race on the ballot — remember there are many county offices and bond issues on the ballot as well as the federal and state offices.

Allow for extra time to enter the polling place and expect to social distance in line (you may bring a portable chair if you are concerned about standing for an extended time). You are allowed to wear a mask into the polling place.

The area within 100 feet of the entrance to a WV polling place is a "campaign-free zone" — to avoid being challenged, don't wear any buttons, hats, shirts, etc. with words or images for/against any candidate or issue within the area indicated by the posted signs.

## **VOTER ID - WHAT TO BRING**

Expect to show a valid and non-expired ID to vote. This ID can be any of the following:

- Voter registration card
- WV driver's licence or DMV ID card
- Driver's license from other state
- US Military ID card
- Government employee ID (US or WV)
- Student ID
- Concealed carry permit
- Bank or debit card
- Utility bill or bank statement in your name (dated June or later)
- Health insurance card
- Medicare card
- WV Medicaid card
- · Social Security card or Birth Certificate
- WV hunting or fishing license
- WV SNAP ID card or WV TANF ID card

If you are voting in WV for the first time, you will need to show proof of residence at your voting address. Bring an ID (with photo and address) from the above list or a photo ID and current (October or November) utility bill, bank statement, government check or paycheck.

If you do not have a valid ID or your ID is not accepted, ask for a provisional ballot. You may still obtain a regular ballot if an adult (with valid ID) accompanying you can sign an affidavit or if a poll worker confirms to have known you for 6 months.

// BOOK REVIEW



IN SPITE of America's inescapable presence in the world stage, our domestic political debates can often be insular and oblivious to international developments that nevertheless have an undoubted impact on our society. When Donald Trump won the presidency of the United States in 2016, the term populism became common currency among perplexed pundits as a way to describe his brand of politics.

Populism is typically analyzed by political scientists, who look at the ideological frameworks and political dynamics at play; historians, who delve into the roots of the different movements; and journalists, who take a more contingent approach to the parties and personalities. Beyond Populism enriches these perspectives with a primarily anthropological view of the political projects typically labeled as populist.

For editors Maskovsky and Bjork-James, the worldwide populist surge is a response to the failure of the dominant political system to make good on "its promises of wealth, security, and prosperity." This system is identified as "neoliberalism." Even though the book does not define neoliberalism at length, a pertinent definition is the one coined by political theorist David Harvey, who describes it as a theory "that proposes that human well-being can best be advanced by liberating individual entrepreneurial freedoms and skills" in a context of "strong private property rights, free markets, and free trade." It is a confirmation of the insularism alluded to above, that neoliberalism, a term that is used all over the world, is rarely heard in America outside of academic debates.

#### POPULISM AROUND THE WORLD

Paradoxically enough, the editors also posit that the blanket term populism is of "limited use" in characterizing many of these current political movements because they are often an expression of specific local contexts. Their approach is nevertheless fruitful in that their book offers multiple examples of so-called populist movements across the globe and the broad differences among them. A chapter on Colombia looks at how the country's elites capitalized on public frustration with guerrilla insurgency in order to gain political control, while the chapter on Brexit delves into how disappointment over politics as usual, antiimmigration and anti-European sentiments, and the rejection of globalization led to a historic vote in the United Kingdom. Meanwhile, Maskovsky's own contribution looks at how Trump seized on frustrations with multiculturalism to undermine the racial consensus that had slowly gained ground during the post-civil rights era.

Throughout the book, we see examples of what the editors define as the three types of anger that fuel these movements: disenchantment with neoliberalism, racial grievances, and "the rage of the downtrodden and repressed." As compelling as this approach seems, labelling populism as primarily the manifestation of angry politics could be construed as a dismissal of the legitimate grievances populism can - and does represent. Likewise, anger does not begin to define movements that have emerged from national populist traditions such as Marine Le Pen's National Assembly, a party that certainly traffics in anger but is also the product of the French political culture, which, as preeminent historians of fascism such as Zeev Sternhell have shown, dates back to the first contrarian responses to the Enlightenment. Likewise, there are populist movements such as Argentina's Peronism whose historic antielitism and redistributionist program cannot be simply described as anger and which, far from having burst into the political mainstream, are an intrinsic part of that very mainstream. These observations aside, Beyond Populism is an informative and insightful addition to the growing literature on a phenomenon that, while difficult to define, continues to shape modern politics.

IT TOOK A FEW YEARS of wandering for Tim Clayton to discover his passion for painting. When describing his path, Tim focuses on the evolution of his approach to art and his style of expression. 

Artists Engage A New Form The Co-Op Haiku



SUZANNE RAVGIALA described the NHK (Japanese public television) show that she happened to see rebroadcast on the local cable lineup about Haiku masters — producers invited viewers in Japan to submit haiku poetry to the show for critique and received tens of thousands of entries in response.

As Suzanne, Jenay Grant, and the other board members of the Washington Street Artists' Cooperative (WSAC) discussed the idea, the thought to solicit poems and combine them with art seemed to fit perfectly with the group's goals of expanding participation in art.

The WSAC project accepted over 20 entries for the current show, a mix of original art inspired by a haiku poem or new poems juxtaposed on an image of an artist's prior work.

The Haiku show runs from October 1 to 31 at the WSAC gallery at 108 N George Street in Charles Town. The WSAC is open Thursdays & Fridays 11 am to 5 pm and Saturdays 10 am to 4 pm



## **HISTORY AFOOT**

**Guide Tours Restart** 



THE CERTIFIED GUIDE TOURS, operated by the volunteers of the Harpers Ferry Park Association, are a special tradition that go well beyond the short tours of lower town provided by rangers through the park service. The standard tour consists of three stops at Bolivar Heights battlefield, Storer College at Camp Hill, and Lower Town Harpers Ferry. Guides can tailor a tour if guests provide requests during registration. Per current health guidelines, guests will now drive their own cars and guides drive separately in their own vehicles. Guests must purchase tickets in advance (see website info below). Tours of Lower Town are also offered on weekends on a walk-up basis (no pre-registration required for walk-up tours, masks and social distancing are requested).

Longtime guide Chris Craig fell into the program through his own curiosity. A long time DC resident, he was a frequent visitor to Harpers Ferry and eventually moved there in 2005. For the next ten years, he operated a bedand-breakfast in his home and continued to immerse himself in the town's history. Enjoying his experience sharing the town with his guests and informally guiding their explorations, Chris decided to take up the HFPA guide training.

As Chris described it, "all of the Certified Guides have to pass a test (you need a high score to pass) and take in-person training with the park staff. Our final preparation is a mock tour with the staff before they allow us to lead on our own. To prepare we read lots of books. The unique aspect of Harpers Ferry are the multiple themes of history that we are prepared to discuss - Lewis & Clark, John Brown, the B&O Railroad — history has a lot of layers in Harpers Ferry."

Chris observed that a common thread among the program's guides is a love of history and the desire to share it with others. It's no surprise then that Chris had many years of experience as a teacher, primarily in special education and math, and that two of his colleagues are also teachers by profession. He describes the program as a "mix of a mission,

an intense personal experience, and something all of the guides enjoy every day. You might be surprised what you learn on a tour. Especially if you live in Jefferson County, it's a great way to learn about local history."


